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Key facts	Each ward was developed on the basis of the nurse's base becoming a fulcrum point for management and observation of the whole ward, with specific attention being given to the flow of public to private space from the entrance of the ward to each individual bedroom space. Bedrooms are clustered in wings to allow flexible placement of patients with varying requirements. Day spaces are central to the fulcrum of the ward with outlooks to more than one direction and orientation. This is to encourage patients from their rooms during the day, to link day space with external leisure areas and to bring as much natural light and landscape into the wards as possible. This was a priority requirement of the original brief which has been achieved with stunning results and the outside spaces now form extensions of the ward therapeutic areas which will be used to great effect throughout the year

## Sustainability

The Project Team are delighted to have achieved a provisional final BREEAM score over 70 which ensures that the rating of excellent has been achieved. No mean feat on a semi rural green field site.

While natural light and ventilation is being maximised to help achieve BREEAM points the team is aware that bright airy premises with pleasant and interesting views out assists in the therapeutic process and reduces recovery time especially in the mental health setting. Biomass heating is provided from the Hospitals centralised energy centre via a district heating arrangement. A form of grey water recycling is being adopted by holding surface water run of in large containment tanks for natural percolation into the Dumfries aguifer below the site. The water supply for the hospital is extracted from the aquifer via a borehole and then pumped into the hospital cold water distribution system. Biodiversity is being enhanced by planting indigenous woodland screening as well as a fruit orchard with large swaths of the grounds being planted pollinators, wild flowers and grasses and allowed to grow unmanicured. Bird, bat and insect boxes will also be installed by patient groups to create an additional therapeutic activity and encourage wildlife into the hospital ground adding to the natural interest available within courtyard gardens.
